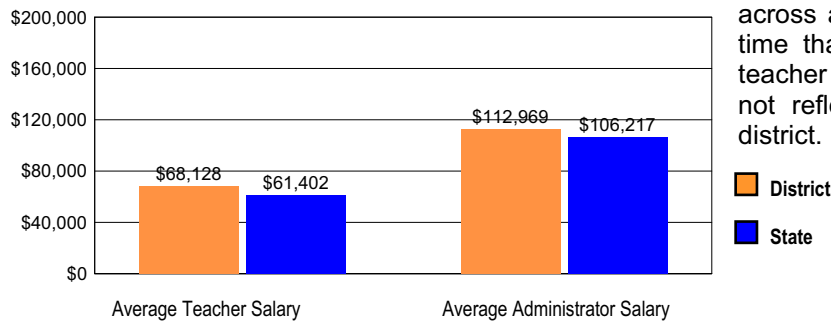

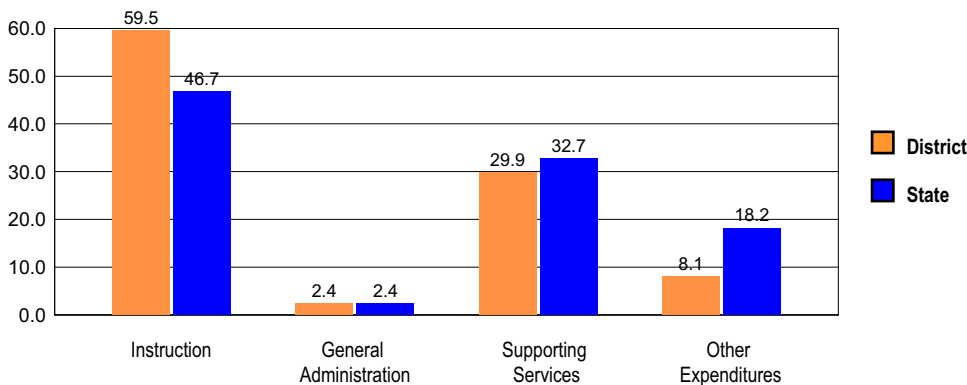
SCHOOL DISTRICT FINANCES

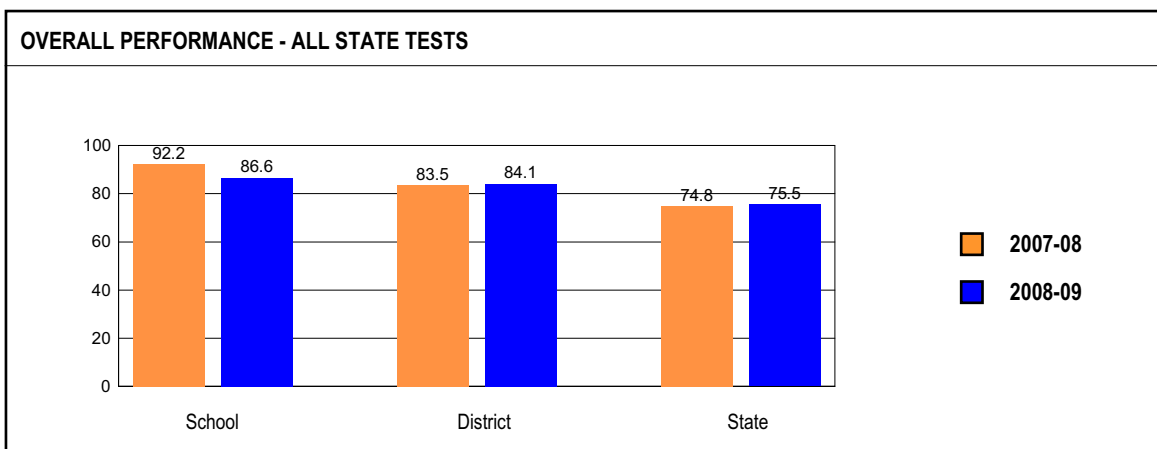

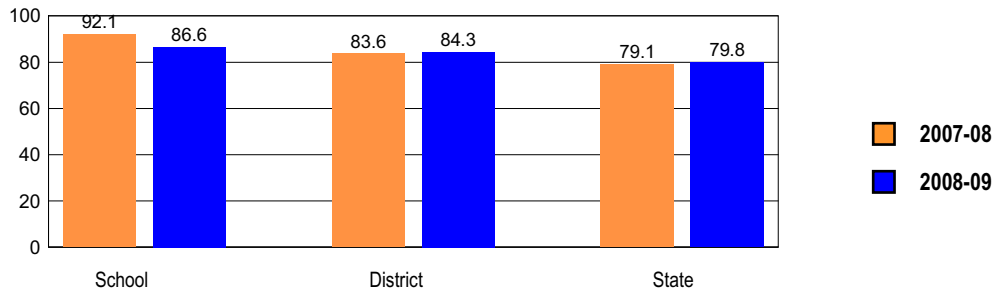
OVERALL STUDENT PERFORMANCE

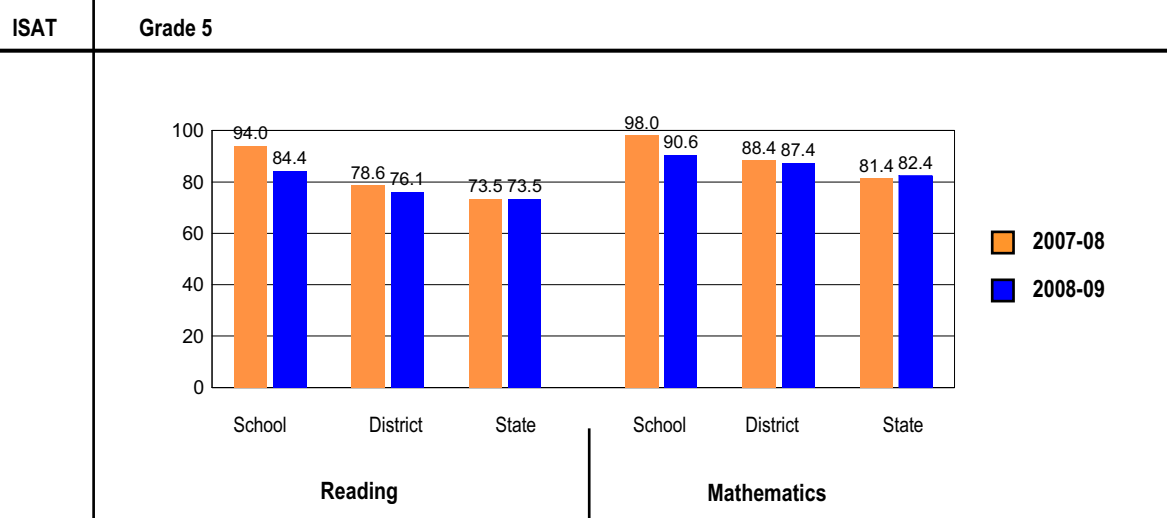
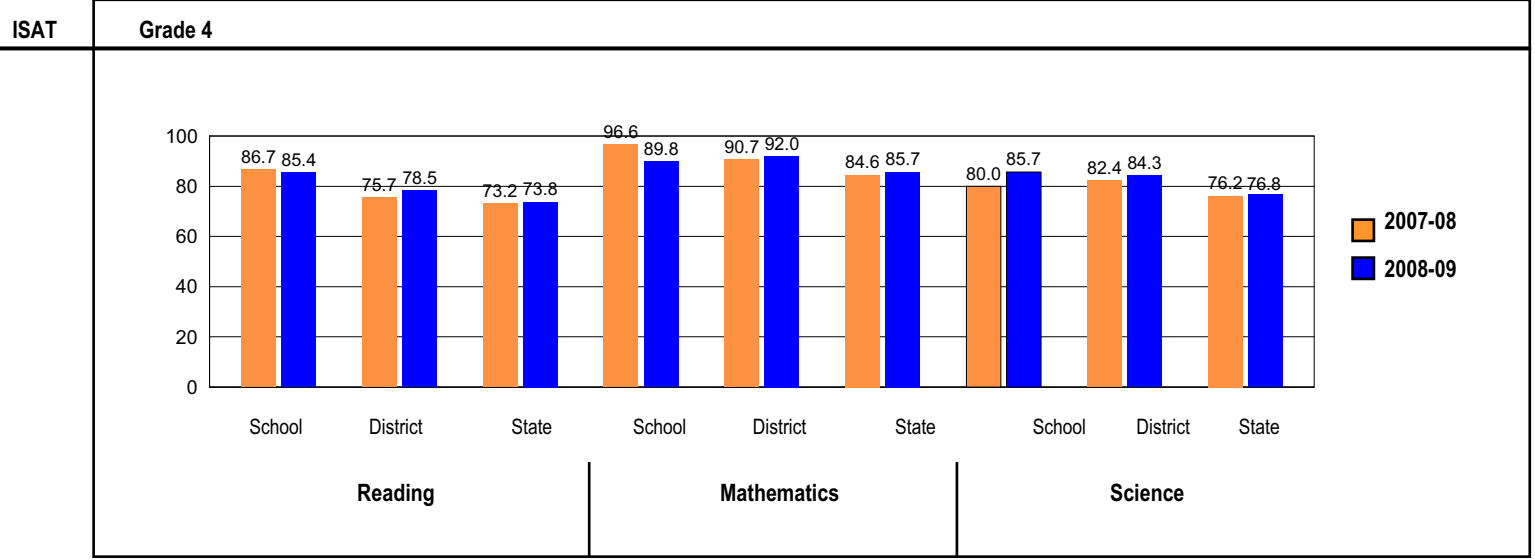
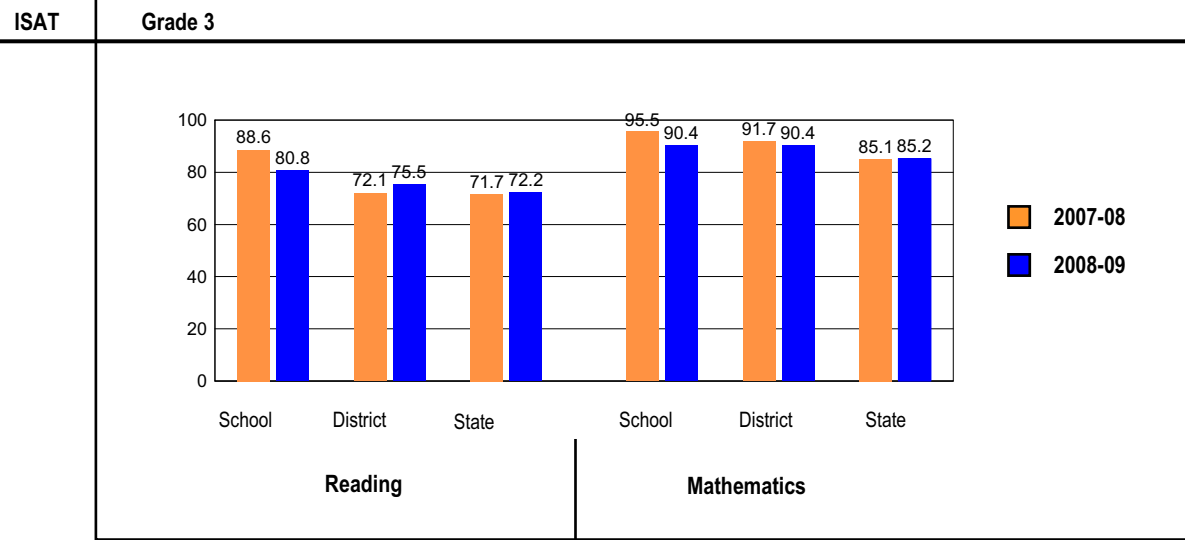


OVERALL ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT) PERFORMANCE

PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS

Federal law requires that student achievement results for reading, mathematics, and science for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3 through 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP (No Child Left Behind Act). An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Reading and Mathematics are tested in grades 3 through 8 and 11. Science is tested in grades 4, 7, and 11.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT)

The following tables show the percentages of student scores in each of four performance levels. These levels were established with the help of Illinois educators who teach the grade levels and learning areas tested. Due to rounding, the sum of the percentages in the four performance levels may not always equal 100.

Level 1 -- Academic Warning - Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.

Level 2 -- Below Standards - Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.

Level 3 -- Meets Standards - Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.

Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards - Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

Four Conditions Are Required For Making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP):

1. At least 95% tested in reading and mathematics for every student group. If the current year participation rate is less than 95%, this condition may be met if the average of the current and preceding year rates is at least 95%, or if the average of the current and two preceding years is at least 95%. Only actual participation rates are printed. If the participation rate printed is less than 95% and yet this school makes AYP, it means that the 95% condition was met by averaging.
2. At least 70.0% meeting/exceeding standards in reading and mathematics for every group. For any group with less than 70.0% meeting/exceeding standards, a 95% confidence interval was applied. Subgroups may meet this condition through Safe Harbor provisions. ***
3. For schools not making AYP solely because the IEP group fails to have 70.0% meeting/exceeding standards, 14% may be added to this variable in accordance with the federal 2% flexibility provision.
4. At least 90% attendance rate for non-high schools and at least 78% graduation rate for high schools.

*** Subgroups with fewer than 45 students are not reported. Safe Harbor only applies to subgroups of 45 or more. In order for Safe Harbor to apply, a subgroup must decrease by 10% the percentage of scores that did not meet state standards from the previous year plus meet the other indicators (attendance rate for non-high schools and graduation rate for high schools) for the subgroup. For subgroups that do not meet their Safe Harbor Targets, a 75% confidence interval is applied. Safe Harbor allows schools an alternate method to meet subgroup minimum targets on achievement.

PLANNED IMPROVEMENT FOR SCHOOL

Target Areas

Based on the state, local and building assessment results, as well as informal methods of assessment from the 2008-2009 school year, the principal, Team Leaders, Student Services Team, and the teaching staff of Central Elementary School have identified reading and writing as target areas for improvement for the 2009-2010 school year.

Measurable Goals

1. 90% of students will meet or exceed standards on the 2010 ISAT Reading Assessment.
2. 85% of students will meet or exceed standards on the 2010 ISAT Writing Assessment.

Activities

1. Utilization of District 62 literacy consultant and the curriculum department to improve instruction.
2. Implementation of differentiated instruction through extension periods and extended day activities, which provide intervention and enrichment opportunities for students.
3. Detailed examination of data to identify specific areas of weaknesses and to ensure interventions target these weaknesses.
4. Increased utilization of RtI model.
5. Strategic implementation of guided reading strategies.
6. Work with Team Leaders and the Student Services Team to refine instructional strategies, student referral methods and research-based interventions.
7. Increase/Improve progress monitoring of students' response to interventions.
8. Utilize volunteers to work with and support struggling students either in small groups or one-to-one (extension period, Earobics, literacy stations, OASIS, etc.).
9. Collaboration focused on balanced literacy and small group instruction.
10. Scheduling supports and allows for small group interventions.

Assessment

The Central School staff will assess student progress through the analysis of assessment measures such as NWEA MAP (Measures of Academic Progress), the ISEL (Illinois Snapshots of Early Literacy), Words Their Way, fluency Curriculum Based Measurements, and ISAT.

Communication to the Public

We will communicate our progress in the areas of reading and writing to the public via our school newsletter, *The Central School Eagle*, bi-monthly PTO meetings, and at parent gatherings such as curriculum night, spring open house, first and last day of school assemblies, and Friday Flag Raisings. Monthly parent nights will also provide parents with information and strategies focusing on different aspects of their child's education.
